


As we move into Fall and approach Winter, I want to take the opportunity to wish everyone in our community a very happy holiday season. Our next newsletter will arrive after the holidays have flown by! In this issue, I have included some important data from our grades 3-8 testing and Regents exams that were administered during the 2011-12 school year.

Grades 3-8 Assessments

The first and second charts (**shown AT RIGHT**) show a three-year trend and some comparative data for our district students in grades 3-8. The "C-A BOCES" line compares our students to all students in Cattaraugus and Allegany Counties, while the "All Districts" line compares SCS to all districts in New York State. Our students have made some very positive gains in several areas. Last year's fourth grade students scored very well in ELA, Math, and Science both in the trend data and when compared to other districts. Our fifth and sixth grade students continued to do well on their Math assessments last year.






Any community members wish to be added to our new Global Connect list?


Regents Testing

Our high school students continued to make gains on the New York State Regents Exams. Our student performance has improved over the past four years on almost every exam. When compared to the C-A BOCES districts in Cattaraugus and Allegany Counties, as well as the rest of the state, our students are very competitive (see the two charts on Regents Testing AT LEFT and BELOW).

Disciplinary Referrals

This information (**shown in chart AT BOTTOM of this page**) shows just a snapshot, not the whole picture, of the climate in our building. It's always encouraging to see the number of total discipline referrals on the decline while the number of students who never earn a referral remains relatively steady and at a fairly high percentage.

Our district is truly committed to excellence. We understand that there is still room for improvement across all areas, both in grades 3-8 testing and Regents exams. Our teachers are working diligently to align our curriculum and instruction to the Common Core Learning Standards while continuing to prepare our students for college and career readiness. ACT Admissions Tests

Watch Out For These Scholarship Scams!

Trying to obtain a college scholarship can be a stressful process. You have to research college scholarships, fill out scholarship applications, write essays, and proof, proof, proof. And just to add more stress to your college scholarship endeavors, you have to watch out for scholarship scams. Every day, college bound students and their parents fall prey to scholarship scams because they don't know which companies are legit and which ones are not. Be wary of a company if they offer the following claims:

"You are guaranteed a college scholarship." No scholarship is guaranteed until your application has been reviewed by the organization that offers it. A company that offers this claim has no control over the scholarship judge's decisions.

"We'll do all the work." In order to receive an authentic college scholarship, you must do the work that is involved. You have to write your own essay and submit your own scholarship applications and letters of recommendation. Most likely, you will not receive a scholarship if a "scholarship company" does all the work for you.

"For a small fee, we'll give you a list of college scholarships." You should never have to pay any amount of money for a scholarship. Scholarship matching services are available for free on the Internet. eCampusTours offers a free scholarship search.

"We'll need a bank account/credit card number to hold this scholarship." Never give out your personal financial information to a company to which you aren't familiar. A valid scholarship provider will never ask for your bank account or credit card number because you do not have to pay anything in order to receive a college scholarship.

"Our database is unique." If any organization claims you can't get the scholarship information anywhere else, don't be fooled. Scholarship information is usually made available to the public, and some scholarship databases might overlap and have the same scholarship information available.

"Everybody is eligible." Scholarships are usually based on merit and/or need and restrictions usually apply. Scholarship sponsors look for candidates that best match their criteria.

"We have a high success rate." Less than 1% of users of fee-based scholarship matching services actually receive a scholarship. The "high success rate" refers to the percent of students for whom the organization finds college scholarship matches.

"Awards are given on a first come, first served basis. Act now." Even though most college scholarships have deadlines, scholarship sponsors do not give out scholarships on a first come, first served basis.

"You've been selected by a national foundation to receive a college scholarship." Research the company before you send anything to them in order to make sure they are legitimate. Call directory assistance to see if the company has a listing. Find out how the company acquired your mailing address and other information. Be cautious about hidden fees.

If you suspect a college scholarship offer is a scam, you can report it to the National Consumers League's Fraud Center by filling out an online complaint form at www.fraud. org. Be sure to keep all literature regarding the scholarship in case you need to send it to the center. You can also contact your state attorney general's office, the Better Business Bureau, your high school guidance counselor, or the financial aid administrator at your college for more assistance.

World Book Online: A Great Website for Homework Help

Here's a great resource for students of all ages and their parents! World Book Online has articles, pictures, videos, websites. primary source documents and more. This interactive online encyclopedia can be used for homework help, answering questions, and just learning for fun.

Our subscription to World Book Online includes several different areas, but each area includes a read-aloud feature and an interactive in-article dictionary.

First is World Book Student. This is a basic online encyclopedia and is useful for answering everyday questions as well as for basic homework help. The articles include pictures and some related websites.

We also have World Book Kids, a simpler version of World Book Student. The articles are shorter and it is easier to find your topic.



are the same or different. September was also the perfect month for learning how to be a good friend: our students found they all have made new friends! What are the Risks of Body Piercing? Advice for Parents & Teens

Teens are pursuing body art at younger ages, often during middle school years or high school, and they often hide their body art from their parents or try to perform self-piercings at home. Talk to your child early about the risks and complications that may occur with piercings. By taking certain precautions and taking proper care of piercings, you can minimize your chances of having a complication.

What are the health risks of body piercing?

- Infection -- Without proper care, infection can lead to scarring and even blood poisoning. Infections of piercings are unattractive and can be very dangerous.
- Allergic Reaction -- Some people are sensitive to certain metals and only discover this when they are pierced and have a severe reaction to the jewelry. Non-allergic metals such as surgical steel, titanium, silver, or gold should be used.
- Nerve Damage -- If a piercing isn't placed carefully, it can be pushed through a nerve, severing it and making the surrounding area permanently deadened. A self-piercing should never be performed.
 - **Excessive Bleeding**
- **Risk of Cross-Contamination** -- You may become cross-contaminated by Hepatitis C or B, HIV, or other blood-borne pathogens if a piercing is done with an improperly sterilized needle or piercing instrument.
 - **Keloids and Granulomas** -- These are toughened knots of scar tissue that look like cysts at the base of the piercing site.
 - **Can't Donate Blood** -- You cannot donate blood for one year after getting pierced.
- **Dental risks** -- There are several problems that can arise from oral piercings, including chipped teeth, worn tooth enamel, damage to the gums and jaw line from wear, and even inhaling a loose piece of jewelry into the lungs. Infection and swelling of the tongue is also painful and unpleasant.

How does your child stay safe?

- **Check Immunizations** -- Make sure Hepatitis B and tetanus vaccinations are up to date.
- Seek a Professional Facility -- Check to make sure they are licensed by the local board of health and have had professional training or certification for performing piercings. The artist should wash hands and wear new gloves before each piercing. Equipment should be single-use, pre-sterilized, disposable needles. Piercing station should be sanitized after each piercing.
 - After Care Instructions -- Should be printed with clear directions and should always be followed to avoid complications.



Seasonal Flu: A Guide for Parents

What are signs of the flu?	How else can I protect my child?	Flu shot or nasal- spray vaccine?	What is seasonal flu?	Flu vaccine may save your child's life.	Is seasonal flu more serious for kids?
The flu comes on suddenly. Most people with the flu feel very tired and have a high fever, headache, dry cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, and sore muscles Some people, especially children, may also have stomach problems and diarrhea. The cough can last two or more weeks.	• Get the seasonal flu vaccine for yourself. • Encourage your child's close contacts to get seasonal flu vaccine, too. This is very important if your child is younger than 5 or if he or she has a chronic health problem such as asthma (breathing disease) or diabetes (high blood sugar levels). Because children under 6 months can't be vaccinated, they rely on those around them to get vaccinated. • Wash your hands often and cover your coughs and sneezes. It's best to use a tissue and quickly throw it away. If you don't have a tissue, cough or sneeze into your upper sleeve, not your hands. This will prevent the spread of germs. • Tell your children to: • Stay away from people who are sick; • Clean their hands often; • Keep their hands away from their face, and • Cover coughs and sneezes to protect others.	 Flu shots can be given to children 6 months and older. A nasal-spray vaccine can be given to healthy children 2 years and older. Children younger than 5 years who have experienced wheezing in the past year or any child with chronic health problems – should get the flu shot, not the nasal-spray vaccine. Children younger than 9 years old who get a vaccine for the first time need two doses. 	The flu, or influenza, is an infection of the nose, throat, and lungs. The flu can spread from person to person.	Most people with seasonal flu are sick for about a week, and then they feel better. But, some people, especially young children, pregnant women, older people, and people with chronic health problems can get very sick. Some can even die. A flu vaccine is the best way to protect your child from seasonal flu. It is recommended for everyone 6 months and older.	Infants and young children are at a greater risk for getting seriously ill from the flu. That's why the New York State Department of Health recommends that all children 6 months and older get the seasonal flu vaccine.

How does the flu spread? How long can a sick person spread the flu to others? What should I use to	People who have the flu usually cough, sneeze, and have a runny nose. The droplets in a cough, sneeze or runny nose contain the flu virus. Other people can get the flu by breathing in these droplets or by getting them in their nose or mouth. Most healthy adults may be able to spread the flu from one day before getting sick to up to 5 days after getting sick. This can be longer in children and in people who don't fight disease as well (people with weaker immune systems). Wash your children's hands with soap and water. Wash them for as long as it takes
What should I use to clean hands?	Wash your children's hands with soap and water. Wash them for as long as it takes to sing the "Happy Birthday" song twice. If soap and water are not handy, use wipes or gels with alcohol in them unless they are visibly soiled. The gels should be rubbed into hands until the hands are dry.
What can I do if my child gets sick?	Make sure your child gets plenty of rest and drinks lots of fluids. Talk with your child's doctor before giving your child over-the-counter medicine. If your children or teenagers may have the flu, never give them aspirin or medicine that has aspirin in it. It could cause serious problems.
Can my child go to school/day care with the flu?	No. If your child has the flu, he or she should stay home to rest. This helps avoid giving the flu to other children.
When can my child go back to school/ day care after having the flu?	Children with the flu should be isolated in the home, away from other people. They should also stay home until they are symptom-free for 24 hours (that is, until they have no fever without the use of fever-control medicines and they feel well for 24 hours.) Remind your child to protect others by covering his or her mouth when coughing or sneezing. You may want to send your child to school with some when coughing or sneezing.

About Special Education . . .

The Board of Education of every school district must locate and identify all children with disabilities from birth to 21 years of age who reside in the school district. If you live in the Scio Central School District and you suspect that your son or daughter (birth through 21 years of age) may have a disability that negatively impacts his or her education please contact Leslie C. Buckley, CSE/CPSE/504 Chairperson at 593-5510, ext. 1140 to learn more about the special education referral process. We offer special education services and related services for all children with disabilities who are homeless or wards of the State, and children with disabilities attending private school, regardless of severity of their disability.

Section 504 Annual Notice

In accordance with the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 commonly known as § 504, the Scio School District hereby notifies disabled children and their parents of the School District duty under the Regulations to § 504.

The Scio School District shall provide a free appropriate public education to each qualified disabled child who resides in the School District regardless of the nature or severity of the disability. The Scio School District shall educate each qualified disabled


child with children who are not disabled to the maximum extent appropriate to the needs of the disabled child, and shall also ensure that disabled children participate with non-disabled children in nonacademic and extra-curricular activities to the maximum extent appropriate. A disabled child shall be af-

forded an equal opportunity for participation in such services and activities.

The Scio School District shall provide disabled children an equal opportunity for participation in physical education courses, interscholastic, club or intramural athletics.

The Scio School District shall conduct pre-placement evaluations, and shall establish standards and procedures consistent with § 104.35 for the evaluation and placement of children who need or are believed to need special education or related services. Periodic reevaluation shall be conducted of children who have been provided special education or related services.


Placement decisions shall draw upon information from a variety of sources and shall be made by a group of persons knowledgeable about the child, the meaning of the evaluation data, and the placement options. The Scio School District shall establish and implement a system of procedural safeguards that includes notice, an opportunity for the parent to examine relevant records, an impartial hearing with the opportunity for participation by the parent and representation by counsel, and a review procedure.

About Pesticides

School law requires the district maintain, on an annual basis, a list of parents who wish to receive advance notice of pesticide use at the school their child attends. To have your name included, a formal request must be submitted in writing. Forms can be obtained by contacting the school.


